#### **VISION ZERO WORKGROUP**


The City Commission adopted a Vision Zero Resolution to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries in the City of Gainesville by 2040. A multidisciplinary Vision Zero Workgroup was formed to help lead and consolidate the Vision Zero efforts. The **VZ Workgroup** is comprised of diverse disciplines including transportation planners, traffic engineers, emergency response personnel from police, fire rescue, and public health and communications experts.

Multiple agencies collaborate in this effort including the:

- City of Gainesville
- Alachua County
- Florida Dept of Transportation
- University of Florida
- Santa Fe College
- Gainesville Police Department

The collaborative focus seeks to advance a common goal and interest in enhancing the safety of the transportation system and all of its users.



























### BRANDY STONE

#### COMMUNITY HEALTH DIRECTOR, GAINESVILLE FIRE RESCUE

Brandy Stone is the Community Health Director with Gainesville Fire Rescue (GFR) in the City of Gainesville. Brandy oversees the City's public health efforts - including the Community Resource Paramedicine Program, Gun Violence, Substance Use, and the city's Community Health Improvement Plan.

As part of the Community Health Director role and based on a community survey facilitated by GFR in December 2021, four priority areas are the focus of the health needs of Gainesville neighbors - mental well-being, safe mobility for all, healthy lifestyle behaviors, and chronic disease management. Safe mobility for all encompasses four objectives - Increase the number of Certified Car Seat Technicians, Offer "Car Fit" for Seniors Training, Increase Walking and Biking Safety, and Increase Transportation Access.

The Community Health Division regularly offers car seat technician training for providers and car set checks for community members, both done by CRP Program Coordinator Krista Ott. Ongoing efforts to increase transportation access, specifically for health and wellness appointments, are underway. Brandy sits on the Vision Zero Outreach subcommittee and assists with safety messaging and outreach. Prioritizing a public health approach, she emphasizes community education and appropriate health information to inform the efforts

More information about upcoming car seat events will be provided soon.









#### PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

#### **SW 62ND CONNECTOR**

The City of Gainesville completed the SW 62nd Boulevard Connector project, opening the 1.1-mile roadway linking the Newberry Road and Oaks Mall area with the Archer Road and Butler Plaza area, improving accessibility, safety, and shaving time off neighborhood commutes.


Funded in large part by a grant from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), the \$18.8 million connector was designed as a multimodal arterial. It features wider (11-foot) travel lanes, ten-foot shoulders with sevenfoot buffered bicycle lanes on each side, and a 10-foot multiuse path. It also includes the first simple span bridge constructed by the City of Gainesville, with a 330-foot segment crossing Hogtown Creek.


The connector uses a "Complete Streets" model, aligning with the Vision Zero Policy, enabling safe access for all people who need to use them, including pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists, and transit riders of all ages and abilities.















#### PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

#### N. Main Street Resurfacing


City of Gainesville included one-mile stretch in North Main Street. It is the first Gainesville road project funded by the half-cent infrastructure surtax dedicated to improving local infrastructure. The city has branded these capital projects as "Streets, Stations & Strong Foundations" (SSSF).


The resurfacing and restriping of North Main Street between 39th and 53rd Avenues includes reconfiguration of travel lanes to accommodate 4-ft bike lanes in both directions, as well as curb ramp modifications for ADA compliance. Construction cost was budgeted in \$1.300M.


